Weight Loss:

Between the exercise and reduced appetite, some dogs tend to lose just a little bit of weight while boarding. Increased/Decreased Appetite:

This can also include water intake. Unless there is a big change noted over several days, there is no need to be alarmed.

Behavioral Changes:

Boarding can be stressful for dogs, especially if it is their first time away from home or their first time visiting a new boarding facility. Your pet may become "clingy" or even "distant" for a few days after boarding. It's a unique process to each and every dog. Hopefully, you won't notice a change, but if you do, please note that your dog should be back to normal within a few days.
